


## Report and documentation

**Town Anywhere (TA) Tooting** was a large-scale, participatory, community visioning experience – bringing together people from across Tooting to 'rehearse the future' of our vibrant community. Town Anywhere 2040 is a fair, flourishing and resilient town that cares for Earth and all future generations.

This report documents the event and the Town that Tooting created,



#### **Summary**

The volunteer team at Transition Tooting – supported by facilitators Lucy Neal and Ruth Ben Tovim, spent several months planning the event. In particular we worked to ensure the widest possible representation. We began by mapping the landscape of Tooting (health, education, green spaces, businesses, faith groups community organisations and so forth) to form the basis of our invitations. From this we drafted a list of key invitations which went out over the summer alongside a social media campaign including the co-creation of a giant Town Anywhere logo to promote the event in the town centre.



On 21st October 2024 around a hundred people of all ages and backgrounds came together in the Samaj Hall to dream into Tooting's possible futures. They travelled to 2040, imagined themselves, imagined our town and explored possibilities in a fair, flourishing and resilient place that cares for the Earth and future generations of all beings.

Together we created homes, shared stories with neighbours, worked together to create streets and neighbourhoods, then co-designed and built a fair, flourishing and resilient town we could move around in and actually inhabit. After a ceremonial 'opening of the town' by the Mayor, we visited each other's 'ventures', feasted, celebrated and after a moment of reflection, travelled back from 2040 to 2024.

We have since held a follow up event; are tracking onward developments and a film screening on Saturday 29th March 2025 will provide another moment of re-connection.

This document contains material generated by participants who co-created Town Anywhere 2040 in Tooting in October 2024. The ideas, requests and ventures shared in this document were generated in response to the following framing, as part of this day-long visioning journey that started with the personal then moved on to the neighbourhood and finally on to the town level.

## This is the introduction given by the facilitators which framed the day and spoken out loud at the opening:

We are Lucy and Ruth

Thank you for agreeing to go on a journey with us today, a journey into your imagination. We invite you for the next few hours to put aside your roles and responsibilities (lanyards off if anyone is wearing them) and just be here today as somebody willing to vision, imagine and play with what a Town called Anywhere could be like in 2040. Your body, heart, mind, your whole self is invited on this journey. Please put your phones on Airplane mode now or switch them off ideally for the whole journey, so that you won't be disturbed. Time travel is serious business and once we've left 2024 we need to avoid any interference in the time travel highway. Look after yourself and your needs and look out for each other.

We will give you instructions and information about each step as we go and some of our team will be filming and taking photographs today so that we have a record of our time travel journey.

Before we step into the future, let's look around us here in the Patider Samaj Hall. Just last week home to Nine Night Navaratri celebrations - a hub for many in the Gujarati community here. For Tooting has always been a hub ... .since the Romans built their long London road from the Thames South to the Coast through Tooting and 100s of years later, the Saxon Chieftain Tota chose to settle here and make home. A Toot was said to be a 'look out post' and that's certainly what we'll be doing today. Let's first imagine a time when this Hall did not exist. Tooting, a mediaeval village, with the monks at the Bec monastery close by might have been catching a bream, or a roach for their lunch. Skilled at water management, they diverted streams and springs that criss-crossed the area (mostly underground now) to make ponds, fisheries and land usable for agriculture. Skilled land workers got out of bed as you have done this bright morning, left their homes for a day's work, set out across Tooting to meet others, chatting amongst themselves, sharing stories. In the late 1700s, at the famed Rollinson's Nurseries, workers would be potting out the seedlings, beautiful plants. A dairy might once have stood on this spot. Imagine early morning milk rounds with churns and horse drawn carts drawing up. And later when Trams arrived, everyone coming in from all directions. So many communities of families have found their homes and workplaces here in spirited Tooting Town: a diverse, vibrant culture of shops, faith houses, restaurants, businesses. You might have seen the blue plaque above Tooting Market, celebrating the contribution of Migrants to Tooting: 'incredible, invincible. A community of all, for all'. Could any of these previous generations have imagined that today as a group we'd be gathering to conjure and imagine new possibilities that maybe do not exist yet even in our own imaginations. We could be making history today, just with our yearning, our longing, and our collaboration. After all, as the writer bell hooks says, "what we cannot imagine, cannot come into being".

Here we stand, looking ahead of us into empty space.

We bring you news that time travel to 2040 is possible today, that there is a small portal open, a window of opportunity for us to step into the future. There are many futures that lie ahead of us, different threads of possibility that stretch out in many different directions. Today we will be exploring the future that results from our collectively doing everything we could have possibly done to care for each other, the earth and all future generations

Today let's imagine that the foundations you have been laying, the different movements for change, the community networks, projects and organisations that have been seeking to bring initiatives together here in 2024 have created a cascade of imaginative, remarkable and positive change by 2040.

Imagine that despite ongoing social, climate and ecological challenges much has been done over 16 years to accept responsibility and find ways to reduce carbon emissions and live within the boundaries of our

planet; to reduce harm locally and globally and to work together in new regenerative ways to maximise our shared resources.

It could turn out to be the making of us.

For one day only we have a chance to travel together to 2040, to this imaginary town called Anywhere. What extraordinary good fortune we all have to be here today.

Over there in this world of the future we'll need to share the precious resources and knowledge we have in this town between us wisely and generously.

Over there, in the future, we will be more dependent on each other than ever before and inter-connection will be one of our strongest tools as we create and make: A fair, flourishing and resilient Town that cares for the earth and all future generations

Here in 2024 the dominant system that we are living and working within focuses on seemingly endless extractivist economic growth that dangerously oversteps our planet's natural boundaries. It's a system where wealth is concentrated in the hands of a few and injustice, inequality and individualism still dominates.

Over there in 2040 we can see and experience how a flourishing, interconnected, fair and resilient system could work together for all beings. We will have the opportunity to create homes, neighbourhoods, open spaces, systems of care, spaces of learning, new forms of governance, celebration and rituals.

We can bring to life, inhabit and breathe in the things we are longing for. And remember as author Dan Delilo says 'Longing on a large scale makes history'

We've got the day to raise the barn of Town Anywhere.

Look ahead of you, what do you see, empty space, possibility.

Look around you, all we have to build our town today is each other, our experience, our ideas, our imagination and a few simple resources ....

Before we set off I need to tell you about this sound Ding-a-ling..... that is our town bell, a signal to stop what you are doing so that we can give you the next bits of building blocks you will need to create the town.

Sometimes we will be working alone, in silence, in groups.

When we ring the bell we begin our time travel counting up from 2024 then when we arrive at 2040 lets step over the threshold and into the space



There were many common factors to each person's 'flourishing'. These included:

- **Social connections**: Family, friends, and community are repeatedly mentioned as essential for happiness and well-being.
- **Nature and environment**: Green spaces, gardens, and the natural world are seen as sources of joy and peace.
- **Health and well-being**: Physical health, mental health, and a sense of purpose are valued.
- **Spirituality**: Connection to a higher power or spiritual practice is important for some.
- **Basic needs**: Access to affordable housing, food, and healthcare is crucial.
- Freedom and expression: The ability to live without oppression and express oneself freely is
  essential.

Overall - a combination of strong social bonds, connection to nature, personal fulfilment, and a supportive environment are key to flourishing in 2040.

Community and health were two key factors for people in a more sustainable food system. This also included shared gardens, a sense of belonging, communal meals and food security. Responsible consumption/production were key factors in a localised, community-driven economy, along with fair prices, local procurement, circular business models, environmentally friendly practices and plasticfree alternatives. Affordable housing is paramount with calls for rent caps and community land trusts. Community-driven housing includes eco-friendly building materials, energy-efficient designs (passivhaus) and resource conservation (rainwater harvesting). People wanted thriving, natural environments that promote health, recreation and community connection with a focus on biodiversity and citizens' involvement. Public spaces would be inclusive, with performance areas, gyms, and accessible green corridors. Accessible, biodiverse outdoor spaces would include urban rewilding, wild playgrounds, uncovering rivers and planting fruit forests. Natural play areas were a priority, along with free food growing and ad-free zones.








We bade everyone farewell with a promise to gather people together again soon, reminding everyone that:

"If you want to go fast go alone. If you want to go further go together"

#### **Breakfast meeting the following Day**

The next day a brief breakfast meeting was held at Mushkil Aasaan for a handful of key Tooting people, including two Councillors; Council staff responsible for town management and leading community activists working in community cohesion, reclaiming open green space, a culture of fixing and repair and community gardening.

Materials generated the day before - venture charters, town themes, postcards from the future were laid out to get a more detailed sense of what had emerged in the process. The objective was to capture and reflect on the energy and ideas from the day.



How could some of these individuals' collective insights help initiatives and projects in the 'real 2024' world of the town work more effectively? How might we continue to build together a fair, flourishing and resilient Tooting town now and in the future. **What had been seen and heard? What had the experience opened up for people - including themselves?** What had people seen in a new way that connected to Tooting and its future? Was a different 'route' to the future now open to people? **Where might we go from here - together?** 

The shared knowledge of Tooting in the room, affirmed both the town's untapped potential for community resilience, well-being and resourcefulness as well as the challenges - for example there are few central gathering places in the town - both indoors and out. It was acknowledged the Council could feel too TownHall centred. Town Anywhere had been a source or 're-energising' for most, with new belief in trusting local knowledge and skills. There was a sense that momentum, one way or another - both existing and catalysed by the day before - would be maintained




#### November 'Regathering' 2024 in United Reform Church (URC)

Participants from Town Anywhere relayed their reflections of the day; all those present exchanged stories (as an example of how the day was experienced) and onward discussions were had about a number of key 'ventures' people were keen to pursue over time in Tooting. This work continues with a screening of the Town Anywhere Tooting film on March 29th in the same venue (URC) made by Lily Lowe Myers from Leytonstone - hoping to host Town Anywhere in October 2025 with Transition Leytonstone.
